



To see if the Town will vote to designate as Town Forest land a certain parcel of land situated on the south side of U.S. Route 2, within the Town of Randolph, Coos Co., State of New Hampshire, being shown as R-15 – 19 on a plan entitled “United States of America White Mountain National Forest, Survey Plat, Tracts 1090 & 1090A The Trust for Public Land,” surveyed by York Land Services, LLC and recorded November 18, 2003 as Plan No. 2105; also including an access right-of-way to said parcel specifically described in the warranty deed conveying the property to the Randolph Conservation Commission dated October 30, 2014; said parcel and right-of-way having been purchased by the Commission on that date with funds provided by Roberta Arbre and Bob Potter for the purpose of having said parcel added to the Randolph Community Forest.
19. Transact any additional business that may legally come before this meeting.



2014 SELECTMEN'S REPORT

2014 saw the completion of our five year revaluation of all properties in the Town, resulting in a ratio of 100% equalization.

- As part of this project a comprehensive review and update of Current Use properties was conducted by the Selectmen's office. The review involved tracking back to the original owner and subsequent owners from the date the property was placed in Current Use to the current date. Updates included condition of property, use of property, forest management plans and recreational discount.
- All Town-owned properties were updated as to their value, and insurance on them was adjusted accordingly.
- All exemptions - veterans, elderly, wood heat and solar - were updated.

Everything is now computerized, allowing for improved search ability and easier updating.

The replacement of the Selectmen's, Tax Collector's and public computers was completed this year. They were outdated and support for them was no longer available. At the same time security and backup protections were upgraded.

The floor in the Cross Meeting Hall was refinished with a product designed to withstand heavy use. It is attractive and appears to be holding up well.

A new metal roof was installed on the leaky old library in order to prolong its life. It had deteriorated badly and resulted in interior water damage to the ceiling and floor.

Repairs for safety were made to the Town-owned Nepalese Bridge at Mossy Glen. It appears, however, that a complete overhaul is needed. This is scheduled to be done in 2015.

The Emergency Management Hazard Mitigation Plan was completed and the EOP Plan was begun. Completion is expected in 2015.

After much negotiation the Town received final payment for the Dam Project from FEMA. It involved much time-consuming red-tape with both State and Federal authorities. Overall, the project appears to be a success. In addition to the FEMA project, we thank the Randolph Foundation for covering the cost of repointing the walls of the dam, which was not allowed in FEMA's design.

2014 SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The long-term Durand Road refurbishing is progressing. Four culverts were replaced and rocks were removed from the travelled way. This project has about six years to go.

The long-awaited repairs to the lower part of High Acres Road and correction of the drainage problem on the steep upper section were put out to bid. The selected bidder was G.W. Brooks of North Conway. The project is scheduled for this spring or early summer.

As for the Ambulance Service, it took several months, but in the end Gorham reduced their \$48,500 charge back to the 2013 level of \$7,925. The Selectmen are requesting the community's input regarding future service at Town Meeting.




Auditors' Report

You make it possible for Randolph Library to continue to flourish. The Library is open a total of 14 hours per week; 4 of these hours are staffed by volunteers and 10 by the library director. In May, of this year Joy McCorkhill became the interim Library Director and in August accepted the permanent position.

Friends of the Library continue to support Randolph public library offering programs all year round. Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-1370 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdf.org.


This past fire season started in early April with the first reported fire on April 7th. April, which is the traditional start to our spring fire season, began very dry with unseasonably dry conditions continuing through the entire month. This dry pattern continued through the first half of May. 80% of our reported fires this season occurred during this six week period. The largest fire was 24 acres, occurring in the town of Tamworth. From mid May through early September, above average rainfall kept our total acreage burned statewide at 72 acres. This is the smallest amount of acreage burned statewide in several years. Late August through late September though brought a dry trend to northern areas, resulting in several deep-burning remote fires. Our fire danger days correlated well with the days that there were fires actually reported. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2014 season threatened structures, and a few structures were burned, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. 2014 Randolph Life Squad Report

Last year, the Life Squad responded to eight calls: 2 motor vehicle accidents, 2 snowmobile accidents and 4 medical emergencies. In all cases, Gorham ambulance responded either with or before Life Squad members were able to arrive. This is probably due to the fact that the ambulance is covered with designated responders 24 hours per day, during the day they are staffed at the ambulance station. Also Gorham dispatch tended to tone the ambulance either at the same time as the Life Squad or slightly before. Six victims were transported to AVH, two were transported to Lancaster. Six calls occurred in the late afternoon, evening. Two occurred in the morning.

The cemetery committee has been active this past year with helping families with burial details, with maintaining cemetery grounds, along with the continued development and maintenance of the perennial ledge and flag pole gardens at the Randolph Hill Cemetery.

We are sorry to hear of the passing of Jim Baldwin who was a member and chair of the committee from 2000 to 2012. He was instrumental in the vision and development of the surveyed plots at the Randolph Hill Cemetery. He will be remembered for his wisdom, quick wit, and steady hand at the helm.

Burials at Durand Cemetery let us remember: John Eusden and Robert Grant. Burial at Randolph Hill Cemetery let us remember: Christopher Aube.

Last year seemed staggering in that there were a large number of those connected to Randolph who have passed on. Interestingly, the average age of those 19 people was 80, but alas, this is normal for NH and for the North East. Many of those have long standing family plots at Durand Road Cemetery and will be here as their final resting place. We ask families who have loved ones cremated and plan to place their ashes in a grave site this Spring or Summer to please notify a Trustee. It is important and necessary we record this for Randolph as mandated by the State of New Hampshire.

Two lots have been purchased at the Randolph Hill Cemetery this year with several families also inquiring into location and availability. 2014 Annual Report of the Randolph Conservation Commission

The RCC is responsible for the proper utilization and protection of natural resources, including watershed resources, of the Town. The Commission conducts research, obtains information, and takes appropriate action to ensure the protection and safe utilization of such resources. (Paraphrased from RSA 36-A:2.)

In recent years, in addition to the matters routinely referred to the Commission as required by law—for example, matters concerning land development and protection of wetlands and watercourses—the Commission has taken an active role in larger issues concerning the Town and the entire region. One such issue has been the possibility that the Portland Pipeline Corporation (PPLC), might follow through on what it has publicly stated it may seek to do: to reverse the flow in one or more of its pipelines, which pass through Randolph and through which crude oil and natural gas have passed on the way from Portland, Maine to Montreal, Canada, in order to pump diluted tar sands bitumen (“dilbit”) from Alberta, Canada to Portland. As is now widely known, dilbit is quite a different substance from the materials that have been pumped through PPLC’s pipelines until now: it is thicker and more abrasive than conventional crude oil, and to get it to move through a pipeline it must be heated up, put under pressure, and diluted with various chemicals, including benzene, a serious carcinogen. Furthermore, the pipeline through which this material would most likely be shipped is 65 years old and was not built for the transport of dilbit. (The other pipeline, which is currently in use by PPLC, is 50 years old.) The age of the pipelines running through Randolph is worrying in view of the fact that both the disastrous dilbit pipeline rupture that severely damaged the Kalamazoo River in Michigan in 2010 (the cleanup has taken four years and \$1.25 billion, the most expensive oil spill in the continental US) and the more recent dilbit pipeline rupture in Mayflower, Arkansas have been blamed on old, inadequate pipe. In this connection, members of the Randolph Conservation Commission have taken an active approach, contacting the media and elected officials, and have travelled to Concord, Manchester, and Washington, DC (not at Town expense) to speak with our state representatives, the Governor’s office, and our congressional delegation about our concerns. We are happy to report that there has been unequivocal support at the congressional level, and that both Senators Ayotte and Shaheen have written to say that they will ask that a Presidential permit be required for any reversal of the flow in the Portland Pipeline. On the state level, our local representatives and Governor Hassan have been very supportive, and in September 2014 the Governor came to Randolph to sign into law three bills involving pipeline safety and regulation.

Another key event was the Conservation Commission’s role as an intermediary in facilitating the gift to the Town, by Roberta Arbre and Bob Potter, of the 72-acre Coulter tract, including the beautiful Rollo Fall, for eventual incorporation into the Randolph Community Forest. (Apparently, that very easily accessible fall will be the only waterfall on the Community Forest.)

In the future the Conservation Commission intends to continue carrying out its mission responsibly and effectively, doing its part to protect the land and water resources, and the residents, of Randolph.

In closing, I should state that the Conservation Commission is deeply saddened by the passing of Jim Meiklejohn, the founding chairman and longtime member of the Commission. He campaigned diligently for a safe and beautiful natural environment for all of us. He will be sorely missed.

2014 Forest Commission Report

This past year was a busy one on the Community Forest with many accomplishments to report.

One of the most exiting projects that was completed was the trailhead at the end of Randolph Hill Road which was built this past spring and dedicated at our Annual Forest Tour. This trailhead provides parking for hikers and others and assures a direct and public access to the lands of the 10,000 acre Randolph Community Forest. We are forever grateful to Becky Boothman for her determination to ensure this parcel of land was made available to the Community Forest from land formerly owned by the Boothman family. We also owe a debt of gratitude to Sally Boothman Glines and the entire Boothman and Glines families for their work in fundraising to assist in the construction of this important town asset for future generations to enjoy.

Other projects that the Forest Commission has been working on this past year include an interpretive trail which will start at the new trailhead and will include stops along the way pointing out special features in the forest. We have also contracted for the layout of a future hiking trail to be constructed to access the Crystal Mine from the Farrar Farm at the west end of town.

Back country skiing opportunities on the Forest are also increasing as some old skid roads and logging roads have been cleared of brush and brambles by numerous volunteers, linking many hiking trails and the 26 mile road system of the Community Forest together creating additional recreational opportunities during the winter months.

After being approached last spring by a commercial maple syrup producer, the Forest Commission and our forester are studying the possible opportunities that may exist for an annual alternative revenue source to be derived from tapping maple trees in certain designated areas on the Community Forest.

At the Annual Forest Tour on the first Saturday in August, the recently completed Historic Structures Report of the Almon Farrar (Levi Lowe house) was presented to the town. The purpose of this report was so that the Forest Commission would have a documented history, description, and general conditions assessment of the property from which future decisions could be based. The group then listened to a presentation discussing the effect of winter ticks on a declining moose population in northern New Hampshire and then travelled to the end of Randolph Hill Road for a dedication of the new trailhead before a short hike and lunch at a recently created wildlife opening.

The Forest Commission also started discussions with the Coos County Conservation District about the opportunity to have a willow and native plants nursery located in the wet meadows of the Farrar tract. The purpose of this nursery would be to grow native shrubs and plants to be used on stream restoration projects throughout the county.

In other work, the Ledge Timber Sale was completed in the spring of 2014 providing timber revenue to fund important projects on the forest. A payment in lieu of taxes (PILT) of \$5,000 was made to the town's general fund from the Forest Management Revolving Fund and an additional \$1,605.00 was approved by the Forest Commission as a 50% match for a State Fire Equipment Grant. This grant allowed for the purchase of a new portable fire pump and hose, four backpack pumps, and wildfire turnout gear. An additional \$1,000.00 grant was made to the Randolph Fire Department to purchase a new fuel tank for the department's backcountry fire vehicle which will be used to transport the new pump and other fire equipment to fire scenes in and around the town.

In continuing one of the important cornerstones upon which the Community Forest was founded, the education of the public on activities which occur on a working forest, students enrolled in the Natural Resources CTE class at White Mountains Regional High School visited the Ledge Timber Sale in February to observe first hand an active timber harvest. Students met with our forester to ask questions and learn that commercial timber harvesting and being good stewards of the land are both compatible activities, improving the overall health of the forest and providing wood fiber and contributing to the local economy.

We are also pleased to report that the second Forest Stewardship Plan has been approved by our easement holder, the State of New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development, and the Forest's Tree Farm Certification was also renewed for another five years after an onsite audit and inspection.

Looking forward, the Forest Commission is excited at the prospect of the addition of a 72-acre wooded parcel to be added to the Community Forest at the west end of town. This important parcel includes the headwaters of the Moose River and beautiful Rollo Falls and the transfer is being facilitated by the Conservation Commission and will be voted upon for acceptance by the town at the upcoming town meeting.

In closing, our forester since the inception of the Community Forest, Walt Wintturi has decided to retire. Walt has worked closely with the Forest Commission for the past 12 years, playing an integral role in the preparation of the first and second Stewardship Plans and then ensuring that the management of the forest has been accomplished in a professional and thoughtful manner; all the while educating many of us on what being a good steward of the land is all about. Walt clearly loved being in the woods of the Community Forest and was always eager to talk about what was happening there. When you asked Walt a question the outdoors became his classroom and you always walked away just a bit wiser. In answering your query, Walt would not only speak about the complexities of managing the trees but also of considering the effects our actions would bear upon all of the other plants and forest dwellers who call the woods their home.

We owe a great deal of thanks and gratitude to Walt for his work, not only as our forester but as an educator, and our friend, and we wish him the best in his future endeavors.

2014 Planning Board Report

At last year's at town meeting, voters approved several amendments to the Land Use Ordinance dealing with the permitting process and minimum standards for driveways, the demolition of structures, and the installation of advertising signs. Having been approved, the Board then met with the Selectmen several times during the year to create the respective permit applications necessary to assist residents in meeting the permitting requirements of these three ordinances.

In April, the Board hosted the annual municipal law lecture which consisted of a review of new laws passed by the legislature and an explanation and discussion of how they may affect current subdivision and land use regulations as they may pertain to the town.

The Board also attended to its annual responsibilities involving the Randolph Community Forest hosting a public hearing to present and then approve the Forest Budget for the upcoming year.

This year the Planning Board has submitted one proposed amendment to the Land Use Ordinance to be voted on at town meeting dealing with the proposed construction of driveways in the setbacks of any lot. The purpose of this amendment is to ensure that if a driveway is proposed to be built within the setbacks of any lot, that there is a formal notification process and opportunity for abutting property owners to respond to the town of any possible impacts this may have to their property. For example, an abutting property owner may be concerned about possible drainage, snow storage or other issues which may be site specific to the area being considered for a neighbor's driveway. The board felt that this input from abutting landowners should be considered prior to the town issuing a driveway permit in any setback and is therefore presenting this change to the Land Use Ordinance and encouraging residents to vote in favor of the ordinance.

The Planning Board meets on the first Thursday of each month and the public is invited and encouraged to attend.

Annual Report of the Family Resource Center To the Town of Randolph - January 27, 2015

FRC Project Youth Afterschool Program: As was made known in May of 2014, the FRC and the Gorham Randolph Shelburne Coop School District jointly filed an application for significant funding to expand the Afterschool Program to Edward Fenn Elementary School and to enhance the existing program at the Gorham Middle School. That funding application, in the course of a very competitive grant process, was selected for funding with FRC's application ranking 3rd in the State of New Hampshire. That funding gives the FRC's Afterschool Program 5 continuous years of financial support for maintaining the program for the benefit of area students and families. At the end of December, 2014, 108 students were enrolled in the Afterschool Program in both schools.

Family Support Programs: The FRC continues to deliver quality family support services to local families including **Toddler Time** for area families. At Toddler Time infant to age 3 children and their caregivers are provided healthy activities designed to improve relationships and strengthening parenting capacity.

In the **Support Services for Veterans Families** and the **Deployment Cycle Support Program** FRC staff provides supportive services to area families whose parent or child is engaged in the pre-deployment, deployment and post deployment cycle of US military service as well as assistance for Veterans and their families who may be experiencing homelessness or unsafe and unstable housing.

FRC's **In Home Family Support Programs** brings experienced case workers into the homes of local families to help heal family dynamics and provide support and referral services to re-energize positive family relationships and re-engage these families into the fabric of the community.

In 2014, with the continuous generous support of local businesses, we continued our traditions of supplying area families & children with **school supplies, winter coats & gear** and **holiday food baskets and gifts**.

We continue to host **Senior Meals** on a weekly basis and otherwise make the FRC available for community gatherings and meetings. Given our current economic climate these assistance programs were particularly welcomed by many.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance: Area families also reaped the benefits of FRC's free Volunteer Tax Assistance Program (VITA) in tax year 2013. County-wide a total of 240 families collected over \$ \$273,700 Federal Income Tax returns due to the FRC's VITA program.

We sincerely thank the people of Randolph for their past and continuing support of the FRC. We are proud of the many relationships we have forged as we work together towards a healthy and vibrant place for families. We look forward to many years of continued collaboration with our neighbors here in Randolph.

ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

2014 ANNUAL REPORT OF DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

For 2014, no assessments will be made to the member municipalities for the District Budget. All expenses will be covered by the Mt. Carberry Landfill Budget.

Our Materials Recycling Facility processed a total of 1,406.99 tons of recyclables, for the period January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, representing \$184,179.51 of marketing income to the District.

For calendar year 2014, our Transfer Station received 2,114 deliveries from District residents for a total of 434.04 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris. In addition, our 346 commercial accounts delivered 283.87 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris and 210.98 tons of wood. Recycling at the Transfer Station consisted of 1,260.86 tons of wood that was processed through a grinder, 166.03 tons of scrap metal; 305.04 tons of leaf and yard waste and 178.57 tons of brush which was chipped. In addition, 290 refrigerators/air conditioners; 56 propane tanks; 5,582 tires; 32,469 feet of fluorescent bulbs; 1,384 fluorescent U tubes and HID lamps; 1,260 pounds of ballasts and 66.73 tons of electronics were recycled. We also received 1,725 gallons of waste oil from our residents which was used in our waste oil furnace to heat the recycling center. Transfer Station recycling income totaled \$40,676.46. The District owns and operates the Recycling Center and Transfer Station.

Election of officers was held at the District Annual Meeting in April 2014: Linda Cushman of Jefferson was re-elected Chairman; Ray Aube of Randolph was re-elected Vice Chairman and Michael Rozek of Berlin was elected Secretary-Treasurer. Other District Representatives are: Raymond Holt of Dummer, Yves Zornio of Gorham, Clara Grover of Errol, Paul Grenier for the Coos County Unincorporated Places, Richard Lamontagne of Milan, Michael Phillips of Northumberland and Colin Wentworth of Stark.

In June, the District conducted its twenty-third annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. The collection was held at the District Transfer Station with 178 households participating. The project was funded through the District Budget. In addition, a grant from the State of New Hampshire reimbursed the District at \$0.177 per capita. The next Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held Saturday, June 6, 2015 at the District Transfer Station.

2014 was the twelfth year of operations for the AVRDD Mt. Carberry Landfill. Since purchasing the landfill in December 2002, no assessments have been made to the District municipalities for Mt. Carberry Landfill operations, with income raised through landfill tipping fees covering operating expenses. The landfill is operated, under contract with the District, by Cianbro Corp.

It is an honor to serve as your State Senator representing District 1, which includes 58-rural, northern communities, encompassing 27 percent of the state's landmass. It is a region larger than two states and 17 foreign countries and containing fewer than twenty people per square mile.
